Will, he was cremated, and the funeral has been scheduled for Thursday, August 5, at 11:00 A.M., in the chapel of the MSA house at 1335 Quincy Street NE. We will certainly miss our brother, who was notable among us for his simplicity, candor, generosity, and spirit of fun. His Will designated Fr Pat Boyhan to be the celebrant, "and humorist." The memory of Br Paul will not fade among us. We pray for his soul, but ask his prayers for our community and apostolic initiatives as well.

I'm sure you've heard by now, but our Society Retreat was a wonderful one. The Retreat Master, Msgr. Charles Pope, is pastor of a black parish in Washington, D.C., and knows how to rock with the flock. If there are any Amens and Alleluias, they well up from a content which is inspired and deeply Scriptural. He's a monsignor, but as fresh as a new priest in his delivery, as rooted in what he says as a ... Pope, as capable of dramatizing his words as Bishop Sheen, and as prompt with humor as Carol Burnette. Those of us who were present have pretty much conceded that this was the best retreat since Fr Menard. We thank him for taking the time in his busy schedule, and pray for him, that the retreat he's to offer the priests of Washington, D.C., may be as effective with them as this was for us. Obviously, we wish that more members had been present, had set this time ahead as a sine qua non occasion and/or expurgated themselves of other concerns for the sake of this sacred hiatus. For next year, our Retreat's to be held from Sunday evening 17 July through Friday morning 22 July. We are asking Monsignor Pope, our Retreat Master again for next year, to give special emphasis to our charism, mission and community life. Fr. Menard says it's within our MSA charism, that we need to exploit "our personal

charism, each one's very personal special grace." If, as the Constitutions tell us, we pledge to live fully according to the MSA charism, then we will strive to serve the Society's charism with our personal charism, our gifts, inspirations, and personal effort. We should remember at the same time that our

motto is "united in the Lord Jesus," which calls us to love one another as brothers. "For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body ... [and as members of the Society, instilled with a share of Fr Menard's charism,] we were all given to drink of one Spirit".
